OUR NEXT MEETING IS THE 19th OCTOBER LECTURE

Jaqui Carey talks us through, Manuscript 82932: A Medieval Embroidered Folded Almanac.

Whilst attending **Winchester School of Art**, Jaqui discovered that weaving combined her love of **mathematics and art**. This led to a **degree in Textiles at West Surrey College of Art and Design**. Here she studied a range of related subjects, like **Japanese Braiding**, or Kumihimo, a very intricate and complex form of weaving structures.

Focusing her attention on this after graduating, led to a **further** potential ideas in **braid-making**; its **aesthetics**, sense of **continuity** and the **joy of creating** ever changing and involved patterns, materials and colours that are integral to her work.

Jaqui's work has been widely exhibited in the UK and abroad.

She has also **written a book,** 'Creative Kumihimo', to explain the way to approach and enjoy this ancient art form, and **curated** 'Braids and Beyond: a Broad Look at Narrow Wares' to celebrate The Braid Societies 10th Anniversary.

Two more books, 'Sweetbags' and 'Elizabethan Stitches', rose out of Jaquie's analysis of old textiles from the 16th and 17th Centuries.

Her **further research** into the wider aspects of braids, **earned her a Queen Elizabeth Scholarship** in 2005, and in 2008 she was awarded **a distinction for her MA** from The Textile Conservation Centre, University of Southampton, on 'The History of Textile and Dress'.

Jaqui's ability to 'read' needlework objects, saw her awarded a **Research Bursary** from The Welcome Trust in 2015. **This is what enabled her to study the Almanac of her talk and write a book devoted to this extraordinary artefact.**
