# **From the Saxons to Mary Berry: a visual History of The English Cookbook' by Dr Peter Ross** Across a thousand years of manuscripts and over five hundred years of publishing, English recipe books have reflected the eating habits of Kings and Courtiers, The Merchant Classes, Inn-Keepers and Restaurant Owners, as well as home cooks and even the paupers, who visited the London Soup Kitchens of Victorian London.

Cookbooks are full of extraordinary food and fascinating illustrations, from medieval illuminated manuscripts, via engravings of Mrs Beeton, to the high-end life-style images of TV's modern cooks. Peter's lecture will tell the story of the development of the cookbook and, along the way, will tempt you, or indeed disgust you, with some choice recipes.

Peter Ross has a History of Art Degree, an MA in London History, a PhD in The Cultural History of The English Criminal and qualifications for teaching adults. He is currently Principal Librarian at The Guild Hall Library, London, and has for 20 years lectured on a broad range of topics, including; The History of English Books and London History.

Peter has also appeared on television and radio as a consultant on the History of English Food. A published author, his most recent is The Curious Cookbook, published by The British Library.
