Grace adorned paintings by many artists, chocolate boxes, Clipper Sailing Cards, Stained Glass Windows, RLNI posters, was praised in poetry and song and, at her last resting place, a monument

and statue were erected.

As Hitler's forces invaded Poland in 1939, men and women from London's National Museums and Archives forged extraordinary plans to evacuate their collections to safety. Utilising country houses from Buckinhamshire to Cumbria, tube tunnels, Welsh mines and Wiltshire quarries, a dedicated bunch of unlikely heroes became the front line in our Heritage War against the destructive Nazis. Dispatching our National Treasures out of the capital and places likely to be attacked, through a series of amazing secret wartime adventures.

Caroline Shenton is an Archivist and Historian and formerly a Director of Parliamentary Archives in London. Her book, 'The Day Parliament Burnt Down', won the Political Book of The Year Award in 2016. Its acclaimed sequel, 'Mrs Barry's War', about the rebuilding of the Palace of Westminster, was a Book of The Year in 2017

Caroline was Political Writer in Residence at Gladstone's Library in 2017. Her third book, 'National Treasurers', will tell of the extraordinary, and sometimes hilarious stories, behind saving London's Art and Museum collections in World War Two.
