- 'Sir Christopher Wren and The Rebuilding of London.' by Janet Gough.

Canon Janet Gough OBE, works on strategic projects to conserve and develop historic buildings for public enjoyment. After working in the City ( Ten years at Sotheby's and Eight as Director of

Cathedrals and Church Buildings) Janet began her writing and lecturing career and so far has completed three books on cathedrals, church buildings and cathedral treasures. She lectures regularly at the V&A and elsewhere.

In 2017 Janet was awarded an OBE for services to heritage and in 2021 she became the one of the first Lay Canons of Bangor Cathedral.

Her lecture subject, Christopher Wren, born in 1623, growing up as a promising young 17<sup>th</sup> century mathematician and inventor. With strong links to the Church and Crown, he grew up in challenging political and exciting scientific times. Wren could have turned his talents to a range of endeavours; from scientific invention to designing the grand, new, Palace of Whitehall. After the Great Fire of London in 1666, he proposed an ambitious new grid design for the City of London. Instead, over the next 50 years, Wren rebuilt 51 of the City's 80 parish churches that had burnt down, using his ingenuity and huge variety. In doing so, Wren created the Auditory Church, setting the standard of the new reformed Church of England for the next 200 years. Spreading his ideas across the world, while creating works of architectural genius – such as his domes and the geometrical staircase in St Paul's Cathedral – that helped establish the great metropolis of London.
