## . Next Lecture: 'Burned, Bombed or Bulldozed. Britain's Lost Houses.' By Matthew Williams.

There is something incomparably romantic and sad about a long-lost country house that stirs us. Although Britain still possesses some of the finest examples of this lost architectural treasures anywhere, too many have been destroyed. A single ruined lodge or pavilion, an overgrown castle, drive or clump of mature trees are often all that exists to remind us of part of our rich heritage. **Matthew's** lecture will tell the story just some of lost jewels from our National Heritage – destroyed by wars or enemy action, arson, neglect, incompetence, family rivalry, financial disaster, profound social change, high taxation, or just bad management. Hundreds of these were demolished after 1945; beautiful or not, they each had a story to tell in their own fascinating way!
