NEXT LECTURE....January 15<sup>th</sup> 2025, Australian Impressionists -The Heidelberg School; Australia's first significant art movement. with Caroline Holmes.

Taking their influences equally from the Royal Academy School in London and the French Impressionists, they never-the-less created their own unique versions of Australia's early days, ones that remained iconic and much admired. Their works developed an informal, evocative and naturalistic style, showing the Australian land and seascapes in a fresh way. From 1885 artist Tom Roberts, recently returned from Europe, joined Arthur Streeton, Frederick McCubbin, Charles Conder, and others painting outdoors. Ranging from Melbourne to Sydney, their 'Artists Camps' aimed to depict the natural bush of Australia in it's harsh sunlight. Later French Impressionism would be affected by their work. Their first independent exhibition, called, '9 by 5 Impressions Exhibition' in 1889, included 183 impressions, most on 9" by 5" cigar box lids, and five sculptures, sought to challenge the unimaginative, 'Zombie' artistic norms of society.

Art Critic Sydney Dickinson calling the collective, 'The Heidelberg School' in 1891, after the town close to where they first worked.

Caroline Holmes has lectured in the UK, Australia, New Zealand, USA, Europe and Japan. She is a University of Cambridge ICE Academic Tutor and Course Director. Lectures at the Royal Horticultural Society, museums and online for The Gardens Trust and organisations worldwide.

Caroline is the author of 12 books, including: 'Monet at Giverny', 'Impressionists in their Gardens', 'Follies in Europe', 'Architectural Extravaganzas' and, in 2020, 'Where The Wilderness Pleases -The English Garden Celebrated.'
