As a committee we were asked by many members, 'Can't we change to the Ceres Hall permanently?

While we agreed that the Assembly Rooms did have a more attractive decor and ambience, the practical reasons behind the move are more important:

- Assembly Room had a maximum of 150 and Ceres double that and we are, with your help, moving towards 200 members.

- Screen size & sound system are both superior and suit our pool of membership, who can see and hear so much better.
- Our projector does not have to be carried in set up/ taken down/carried away.

- There is technical help at hand if needed, provided with the hire.

- Ceres has no stairs or unreliable lift to contend with.
- Refreshments are easier to manage and better than the Town Hall.
- Numbers of people expressed how they enjoyed the space in Ceres more.
- After a financial study, it was found that we could afford the price.

On the basis of the above the Committee voted for the move.

There are decisions that have to be made for the future and interests of members. Naturally, we are sad to leave the beautiful Assembly Room, yet, our growing numbers and the reasons above, made it necessary.

NEXT LECTURE....February 19th 2025, BRINGING INDIA TO BRITAIN by Helen Rufus-Ward.

This lecture will begin with the portraits decorating the corridors of Queen Victoria's favourite home, Osborne House, on the Isle of Wight.

Austrian artist, Rudolf Swoboda, was commissioned by Her Majesty to paint authentic portraits of her Indian subjects to represent., 'various types of nationalities' there.

Swoboda brought back some extraordinary images from his two visits to India and the Queen was thrilled by them! Calling them her 'Beautiful Things'

The final part of the lecture will look at an exquisitely crafted Durbar Hall, created and shipped over from India, to serve as a backdrop for The Colonial and Indian Exhibition. It is now the centrepiece of the Hastings Museum and Art Gallery, having been gifted to the town by the Brassey family.

Dr Helen Rufus-Ward is an art historian, with a BA, MA and an Arts and Humanities Research Council funded Doctorate (DPhil) from the University of Sussex, where she worked for 10 years. A published author, Helen has written on: Late Antique Ivory Carvings and 19th Century Plaster Castings.

Helen holds a Higher Eduction Academy Teaching Qualification, is a member of the Society for the Promotion of Byzantine Studies the Society of Jewellery Historians and is Chair of Eastbourne Arts Circle
